Remarks about *Adam* from contest judge Sophie McManus:

At first glance, this slyly ambitious story is about how Kate, a therapist, grapples with her long-suppressed attraction to women and her unhappy marriage to Harold, a recent veteran of war struggling to reintegrate into civilian life. Through authoritative, spare-but-spot-on world-building, the reader discovers that Kate's dilemmas are playing out in an eerily plausible future: World War Three has ended; Harold, wounded and traumatized, is more attached to Adam, the drone who fought beside him, than he is to Kate; certain basic rights and resources are gone. Yet many remain. Life continues apace. Part of the story's trenchant vision is that dystopian calamity might arrive more quietly, more privately, than an explosion and camera-pan to rubble. *Adam* suggests that when freedoms are limited, the erosion of the human spirit is a disaster as significant as any blast.

Excerpt from professor's evaluation:

Lucy Caborn is a uniquely gifted writer with an imagination that seems boundless. With every story she writes she creates a subtly strange new world. She generates terrific first drafts, but she is also a committed, careful reviser. She is willing to work on a story until it is doing everything she wants it to do. Her profound empathy for even her most morally complicated characters comes through in every moment of every story she writes. In each story that I've read by her, there comes a point when my heart breaks a little bit. This was my second consecutive semester with Lucy as a student.

This semester we worked together on four stories. Her first workshop story was "Cowboy," which focuses on Pete, a man who had been serially abducted out of time and space by men in orange jumpsuits who are studying him for unknown reasons. As the story begins, he learns that they are growing bored with them. This creates the impetus for him to take rash actions that have been hovering just beneath the surface of his being for a long time. Unhappily married, financially dependent on his wife, well-meaning but impatient with his son, Pete flings himself at his high-school sweetheart who has just moved back to the neighborhood. The story is wonderful and complex, like everything Lucy writes. She revised it twice—once ahead of and once after the workshop. Her second workshop story was the nearly perfect Saudade, which begins with what seems to be an omniscient third person narrator, but that turns out to be told by the ghost of the protagonist. This was a virtuosic turn in the craft of Lucy's writing. We also worked on "Adam," which she wrote in the spring of 2017 and continued to refine this fall. In workshop discussions and her written critiques of her fellow students' work, Lucy is kind, focused, and helpful. She is someone who brings the best qualities out in her classmates. In both of the groups I've seen her in, there has been universal respect for her and her writing. She was punctual and responsible and had very good attendance. When she missed class or conference due to illness, she let me know ahead of time. I wish her all the best as she continues to write her marvelous stories and look forward to staying in touch.
